Long vowels follow the same general principle as the short ones; their vowel being already long, no further change takes place in the oblique singular. The formation of the plural is multiform, and will be discussed in a separate section; the oblique plural, like that of class 1, only differs from the singular by the addition of anuswara in nouns ending in d: in other cases anuswara is added to the form of the nom. plural, which is a recrudescence of the vowel of the singular into its semivowel, effected by the addition of d.
